# <u>Vicar's Vagaries - Gifted Members</u> +

Though I had played sports as a youth, when I got married, I hardly watched any sports at all. But Cindy was different. As a Knoxville native, she grew up watching UT football and basketball games with her father. In our married life, she has maintained an abiding interest in football, basketball, swimming, and the Olympics. When our children were young, many of our family activities involved sports. Now that our children have grown and left home, Cindy and I still watch sports. We cheer for our favorite athletes the way we used to cheer for our sons. It's one of the things we do together, one of the things we talk about. I am glad for the common interest.

After the UT and the Titans' football seasons ended, and the NCAA basketball tournament ended, we decided for the first time in years to watch the NBA Playoffs. We both care about Grant Williams (on the Celtics) because we watched him play for UT.

You can't watch all that sports and read the Bible and not find some connections between the two. I see one very big connection between what is true in sports and a major teaching of the Christian faith as expressed in scripture. A sports team consists of several different members. The best players are those who, like Nicola Jokic of the Denver Nuggets, highly value the part played by all the other players on the team. Sometimes very highly talented athletes don't help their team play better because they think they are the only important players on the team, and that the others don't matter. But a team possesses a variety of gifts. All the different players have gifts to offer. When the stars take over and don't help the other players make their contributions, their team is not likely to win. Even Michael Jordan had to involve the other players on his team. As good as he was, he didn't win games by himself.

Likewise, the members of a congregation bring to the Church a great variety of gifts. St. Paul puts it this way in the First Epistle to the Corinthians. "Now there are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit; and there are varieties of services, but the same Lord; and there are varieties of activities, but it is the same God who activates all of them in everyone. To each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good." (I Cor. 12:4-7) Not everyone is an apostle; but all Christians have received the Holy Spirit, and the Holy Spirit bestows rich gifts upon each member of the Church.

One of the reasons I love serving as a priest in the Church is because I get to know every member of the congregation I serve, and I often get to see the gifts the Holy Spirit has given to God's people. When I was fresh out of seminary, I didn't know what to expect from church members. I thought I had a wealth of knowledge and abilities, and that I would be called upon to teach and lead, and the church members would learn and grow. I would give, and they would receive. Now I see that I am just one of a surprising mix of people who possess a large diversity of gifts. And I have learned that an amazing variety of gifts has been poured out upon any group of Christians who assemble in the name of our Lord. Challenging times sometimes provide just enough pressure to bring out gifts that might otherwise have lain dormant. Lately, we have had some challenging times, and people at Grace have stepped forward to offer their gifts for the well-being of the Church and the glory of God. I won't name names. You know who you are.

If you aren't so sure what your gifts are, I would love to talk with you about what inspires and interests you. It may be that I can help you discern gifts the Holy Spirit has given you which you did not know you had.

I try not to worry much about the Church these days. God knows what gifts he has given to the members of Christ's body, and he knows what he is calling them to be and do. I try to trust God to do his part while I put my effort into assisting the members of Grace Church in worshiping God and discerning and following God's will for them. I am always surprised at how God makes his goodness and strength manifest whenever the members of Grace Church step out in faith to serve him and to love one another.

## Hail, Thee, Festival Day!

One of my favorite silly sayings is "I learn something new every day, if I'm not careful." That was especially true today, as I began to look for information on the hymn "Hail, Thee, Festival Day"!

In our hymnal there are three hymns that begin with the phrase "Hail Thee, Festival Day!" One is an *Easter* text, one is an *Ascension* text, and the third is a *Pentecost* text.

The author is Venantius Honorius Fortunatus (c. 530-609), who was born in Italy and died in France. Tradition says that he lost his sight, and it was restored

by the anointing of oil from a lamp from the altar of St. Martin of Tours in Ravenna. While on pilgrimage to St. Martin's tomb he was encouraged to visit Poiters, where he later became a bishop.

Fortunatus was the author of more than 250 poems. The texts for these three hymns are found in a Latin poem of 110 lines, which was written to celebrate the conversion of the Saxons by Felix, Bishop of Nantes (c. 582). There have been several translations over the centuries, including one by Thomas Cranmer in 1544.

The tune we use to sing these three hymns was composed by English composer Ralph Vaughan Williams. It is perfect for a stately processional hymn, supported by the moving pedal line and the heart-lifting refrain.

This unusual hymn spans the church year from Eastertide to Pentecost. Here are the opening refrains from each of the hymns:

Hail thee, festival day! Blest day that art hallowed forever, day whereon Christ arose, breaking the kingdom of death.

Hail thee, festival day! Blest day that art hallowed forever, day when the Christ ascends, high in the heavens to reign.

Hail thee, festival day! Blest day that art hallowed forever, day when the Holy Ghost shone in the world with God's grace.

#### **Summer Plan Set for Children's Church**

This summer, we are doing something a bit more adventurous in Children's Church. We're taking a look at some of the lessons in the Old Testament. Not only are we going to hear the stories, but also experience them with our other senses.

The lessons will start at the very beginning with God's Creation and the Garden of Eden. Next, we will be experiencing Abraham's covenant with God. Then we move to Moses and from being a babe in a basket to his mighty journey leading God's people out of slavery in Egypt to the Promised Land, with several bumps along the way. Make sure you stop by the children's room and see the changes. And I'm sure the kids will be glad to let you know what we're learning this summer.

Since it is summer and people will be traveling, we will be spacing out when we have Children's Church. In June, we will meet on the 11th and 25th. In July, we will have it on the 2nd, 16th, and 30th. We will not have Children's Church during the month of August but will be back to having Children's Church every Sunday in September.

## **Safeguarding Course**

It is essential to provide a safe and caring space for Grace's most valuable assets: our members, families, and friends.

The following clergy, lay employees, Mission Council members, children's church volunteers, etc., are required to complete eight Safe Church, Safe Communities training modules within 90 days of hire or placement:

Full-time and part-time church staff, whether paid or volunteer • vestry members • church treasurer • choir directors • Mission Council members • childcare workers • youth/children ministers and teachers • spiritual directors • Licensed worship leaders (preachers, catechists) • new member ministry leaders.

Following are the required courses to be completed:

- 1. Safe Church, Safe Communities: Introduction & Theological Background
- 2. Policies: Episcopal Diocese of Tennessee
- 3. Safe Church, Safe Communities: Inclusion
- 4. Safe Church, Safe Communities: Healthy Boundaries
- 5. Safe Church, Safe Communities: Power and Relationships
- 6. Safe Church, Safe Communities: Pastoral Relationships
- 7. Safe Church, Safe Communities: Abuse & Neglect
- 8. Safe Church, Safe Communities: Bullying

<u>The above listed courses are all you need to complete</u>. When you access the website, you will see many more courses available in addition to the ones listed above. Please understand that you are only required to take the courses listed.

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You will receive an email from me advising the necessity of taking the Safeguarding Course. So, if you recently became one of Grace's volunteers as noted above, please be on the lookout for an email message from me sharing the details of this course. If I do not have your email address, or if you don't have one, please let someone know so I can contact you by phone.

Please note that as long as you are serving in one of the capacities indicated above, you are required by the Diocese to take the course *every five years*.


Her favorite Bible verse is John 3:16 the numbers of hope.

Fr. Joe gave an opening prayer.

Scribe's Report – Will Pomeroy is filling in for Chuck Warnick who is on vacation. The minutes for the March 2023 Annual Meeting and the minutes for the Mission Council Meeting of March 15, 2023, were reviewed and accepted.

Treasurer's Report: David Thomas sent the November financial reports to the mission council members. Please see the previous article on this page. After discussion, the Treasurer's reports were accepted. We need the written job description for the Treasurer. There was discussion about parking some of the money in a CD. The finance committee and MC will look at rates to make the best decision. Bill Rieger is straightening up the situation with bank cards. We received an online donation from a nonmember and the church will reach out to that person.

**Vicar's Report**: Fr. Joe shared the following items: ❖ Father Joe gave a report of Father Peter's continue to catch up with members we have not seen lately. Attendance has been picking up since March. Children's church is helping to bring up attendance. ❖ 32 average Sunday attendance for last year. This year is about 34-35. Online numbers are higher too. ❖ Holy Week – Services and Activities had a good feel. Many people did their part and more. ❖ Having two LEMs to help with Communion really helped. Fr. Joe has completed and sent in the 2022 Parochial Report. A session of anti-racist training will be held at the Church of the Advent in Brentwood on May 20. May 16th is the 145th Grace Church Consecration Anniversary. There will be a dinner on May 18th. Carol will look into getting a banner to announce our 145th year out front.

Sr. Warden's Report: Carol Martinez ❖ We do not yet have a regular cleaning person. Check the dishwasher as the McMod person in the morning. � Special recognition will be given for those graduating in May. May 21st is graduation recognition day.

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Jr. Warden's Report: Bill Rieger ❖ Bill reported there were 3 who attended the outside cleaning. ❖ The sacristy door is rotting badly. ❖ Bill has emailed the person about the parking lot getting recoated. Awaiting a response. ❖ No immediate issue with the roof but it might only last 1-5 more years. ❖ The grate needs repair. The floor is of the church is sagging down. He is looking at options to reinforce the floor as it is.

## **Liaison Reports:**

- ❖ Children's Ministry Will Pomeroy \* Children's Church is still going well. Starting in June and July, it will only be the 1st and 3rd Sundays of the month and there will be none in August. \* Bell ringers at the close of the service are going well.\* Children will be invited to come to Creative Mondays in June and July. 1-3 pm.\* Our Children's Church is doing activities with our older members.
- ❖ Communications Peggy Roberts \* Went to diocesan meeting in Brentwood for the vestry and mission council members. Most of the meeting was about the history of the church in Tennessee. There are forty-five congregations in Middle Tennessee with a sixteen million dollar budget.\* Peggy has completed the new member directories and they look great. \* Membership decline is result in deaths and not being able to replace with new members. \* 2020 decline is 3.3k membership statewide. \* New members are continuing to come to Grace and our members continue to reach out to them.
- ❖ Community Outreach \* Grace donated two hundred ninety-seven and one-half lbs. of food year-to-date. This doesn't include any donations from individual members outside of our church collections of food. \* We are collecting plastic bottle caps to make benches for the community.
- ❖ Congregational Life Robert Chapman \* Talked about doing another Divine Swine for next year. \* Asking members to sign up for the 5th Sunday Brunch. Robert fixed the rocking chair.

Next Mission Council Meetings: May 17, June 21, and July 19.

Fr. Joe closed the meeting with a blessing at 7:28 PM.
