1. Which of the four gospels tells of the Wise Men? How many are there?
2. In which gospel do angels sing to shepherds just outside Bethlehem?
3. What part of the Sunday Eucharist contains the words sung by the angels to the shepherds?
4. What line in the Nicene Creed mentions a biblical doctrine about Mary?
5. Which gospel calls the second person of the Holy Trinity "the Word" and says that "The Word was made flesh and dwelt among us"?
6. Which gospel skips the birth of Jesus and goes straight to John the Baptist for its beginning?

14. Who are the Holy Innocents, and when does the Episcopal Church celebrate their feast?

15. What happened to Jesus on the Feast of the Holy Name, and when does this feast occur?

16. What animals were offered in the place of the baby Jesus at his presentation in the Temple forty days after his birth? (See Luke, chapter 2.)

17. Can you have "Christmas" even if you get no presents? How? (Hint: what did the Whos in Whoville do on Christmas morning?)

18. Where does Santa's hat come from? (Please don't say "the costume rental place.")

19. What is your favorite Christmas carol?

20. What is your favorite Christmas movie or story? And here's a brand-new question for the 2020 edition of the quiz:

What do you especially appreciate about Christmas this year?

Joy to the World!

Surprisingly, this hymn was not written for Christmas. Rather, Isaac Watts wrote the hymn as a paraphrase of the last five verses in Psalm 98 for his 1719 publication, *The Psalms of David Imitated*. In this hymnal, Watts rewrites many of the psalms using a Christological lens. His versification of Psalm 98 is no different. Verse nine of the Psalm reads, "let them sing before the LORD, for he comes to judge the earth. He will judge the world in righteousness and the people with equity." Watts unapologetically interprets this as a reference to Christ. The theme of "Christ coming" made it an apt hymn to be sung at Christmastime, and it has since become one of the most beloved Christmas carols.

Albert Bailey writes, "It is one of the most joyous Christmas hymns in existence; not in the sense of merry-making but in the deep and solemn realization of what Christ's birth has meant to mankind" (*The Gospel in Hymns*). Watt's text has almost been left untouched by editors, with one exception. The line "far as the curse is found" is left out of many hymnals, since there is no reference to this curse in the actual psalm. However, when seen through the eyes of the New Testament and Gospel message, the reference to Genesis 3:17-18 becomes quite clear.

- Reimbursement requests, invoices, etc. for the year 2020 must be turned in before Jan. 10. Anything submitted after Jan. 10 will be considered a 2021 expense.
