Vicar's Vagaries

May14, 2020

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ.

As we hit the mid-point in May, I look back on the last two months as a unique era the life of our country, the history of our congregation, and in my own life. In these past two months, I have asked people *not* to come to church, and I have indefinitely postponed the baptism of a baby. I prayed for a church member as he had surgery, but I did not go visit him at the hospital or at his house. I have invited people to attend our church from all over the country and the world, though it was not an inperson service I was inviting people to attend. I have preached to a bright dot on a cell phone about 15 feet away and felt as though I were talking into the emptiness between our solar system and another solar system many light years away.

I have learned to appreciate as never before what Susan Browning and other helpers have done to prepare service bulletins, records, and communications with the congregation. (Susan is still our bookkeeper, but she is no longer preparing bulletins or email for us.) I have taken great joy in brief conversations with strangers at the grocery store, and I have missed talking with the people I have come to know and love at the altar and parish hall of Grace Church.

We have held our first mission council meetings and coffee hours on a computer, and we have been glad to be able to do it that way. We have noticed the world of nature come alive in the early spring, with the birds singing in the rising of the sun, and the new growth and flowers coming out all around us. We have kept a Good Friday that felt like the whole world was suffering with Christ; and while the death

rate continued to climb, we looked with hope through the calendar date of our Easter celebration to the eternal resurrection from the dead that Christ's own Easter victory makes possible for all the children of Abraham. I have begun leading Bible study again, as I used to do for most of the years of my priesthood, and it has felt to me as though finally I am getting to do what I have missed most for the past 7 years.

What is the cutting edge of your growth in the time of the coronavirus? Mine may be a matter of attention. I am trying to learn to pay attention to fewer things. Allow me to explain. The other day, after a rather strenuous period of work, I sat down and turned on the Tennis Channel, my favorite form of relaxation. I saw Roger Federer playing Rafael Nadal in a replay of their 2017 Australian Open Finals match. I was thinking, "This is so good! I want to make this better! I will get some chips and some salsa, and maybe some cheese and nuts...." But then I stopped myself and said, "No. I will just sit here and watch one thing. I will pay attention with all the focus my eyes and ears can bring to bear. This one little experience is good enough that it doesn't need anything else to make it better." And it was much sweeter because I sat still and gave Roger and Rafa my full attention. When Roger won, I was present, even though it happened three years ago.

I am trying to do the same in my prayer life, and in my relationships with people, and in my walking, and in my working. Can I accept a simpler way of focusing my mind? While less is going on in our world, we are being given a golden opportunity to pay attention to what is in front of us, and to accept it as the gift it is. Let us say with God our creator, "Behold, it is very good!"

New Act Offers Giving Incentives

Grace Episcopal Church depends upon generous donors to support our mission and ministry. Stewardship can be deeply spiritual, rooted in a desire to reorient our lives towards God, but it also has a practical side. The Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security Act (CARES) that was signed into law on March 27, 2020 includes several provisions that may affect charitable giving during 2020.

Beginning in 2020, individuals can deduct \$300 in charitable contributions from their gross income even if they do not itemize their deductions. Donations must be made in cash to a charity.

Donors who itemize their deductions can usually deduct cash contributions up to 60 percent of their adjusted gross income. For 2020, that cap is lifted and donors contributing cash to a charity may deduct up to 100 percent of their income. This presents a significant tax savings for those who can contribute larger amounts and may be useful for donors with unusual income in 2020.

Also, the CARES Act eliminates required minimum distributions (RMDs) from many retirement plans in 2020. Some donors use their RMDs for tax advantage charitable gifts by making a qualified charitable distribution (QCD) directly to a charity. This is another way for donors to make gifts to the church.

The CARES Act is a complex new law. Donors may want to consult with their own professional advisors before making a gift.

Keep Singing Your Faith

One of the things I have missed the most during this time of quarantine is singing hymns together on Sunday morning. Playing, singing, and hearing our songs of faith brings me comfort, encouragement, joy, and strength.

During this difficult time, I have been using my phone to continue singing these wonderful hymns, and I encourage you to try this on your phone or computer. The easiest thing to do is to go to YouTube, and search for a favorite hymn. You will find many performances – pick one and sing along! Some of them will have the lyrics on the screen, which makes it easier.

Another site to look up is hymnary.org. Along with reading the text and hearing the tune, there is a wealth of information about the hymns themselves – the authors and composers, etc.

On Sunday, May 10, I played "Now Thank We All Our God" for the postlude. The words were written by a Lutheran pastor named Martin Rinkart in the 1600s, during a time of plague and war. Despite having buried over 1,500 of his townspeople in a year, including his wife and several children, he wrote these words in gratitude to God for all His blessings. These words are a beautiful reminder of where our faith must be placed, and the joy that is possible, even in a time of quarantine.

Keep singing your faith, even during this time of uncertainty!
