Deportment and Piety

Deportment is how you carry yourself. Piety is your attitude of reverence for God which can be expressed by physical acts such as signing the cross and bowing your head. Many members of Grace did not grow up Episcopalians, so they were not taught deportment and piety as children, and clergy do you a disservice to assume that adults or children will just pick up everything without being taught or shown what to do and what it means.

Standing, sitting, and kneeling are the three postures we adopt in our worship services. We stand when the celebrant enters the church to begin the service, or when he or she leaves the church after it is over. We stand for the opening and closing processions and for the gospel. Standing shows respect for what is happening at these important moments.

Sitting is what we do when we are being taught or when we are hearing a sermon. We also sit for the psalm at the Eucharist.

Kneeling is the traditional posture for prayer, though it is also traditional for people to stand at prayer. I don't use our pews, so I am not sure what it's like to kneel on our kneelers; but if you are physically able, it is best to pull the kneeler out so you can kneel for prayer at the confession and during the consecration. It is acceptable to stand or kneel

at these times. Kneeling is done best with the back straight and the elbows resting on the pew in front of you. If this posture does not work for you, do what you need to do. It is always good to be present to pray in God's house of prayer. The main thing is to be respectful towards God and one another.
