The Book of Common Prayer: A Matter of Life and Death

The rubric on p. 462 of the *Book of Common Prayer* says, "When a person is near death, the Minister of the Congregation should be notified, in order that the ministrations of the Church may be provided."

Please turn to that page and see what is there. Unless you have experienced praying this litany and these prayers with a dying loved one, you may not even know this section of our prayer book exists.

The first petition reads, "Almighty God, look on this your servant, lying in great weakness, and comfort him with the promise of life everlasting, given in the resurrection of your Son Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen." This is a powerful start to a strong collection of prayers. Every Episcopalian should know where to find these pages, because you never know when you might be called upon to lead these prayers.

Yes, the rubric says to call your priest, and I hope you will. Praying this service is one of the most profound experiences of my life, and I will be there for you in your time of need if at all possible. But even if a priest cannot be reached, any layman can use the *Book of Common Prayer* and lead these prayers.

There is a litany made up of verses and responses said by the leader and the participants, who would be family members, loved ones, and possibly even medical personnel or caregivers. Being involved in these prayers means you are helping a loved one pass from life to death instead of sitting by anxiously, feeling helpless, while you watch this dear person's life slip away.

You pray the Lord's Prayer together. It is always an appropriate prayer under just about any circumstances, but it takes on new meaning when you are praying it for or with someone who is dying. When the time comes, the leader says a prayer of Commendation at the Time of Death (p. 464).

Depart, O Christian soul, out of this world; *In the Name of God the Father Almighty* who created you;

In the Name of Jesus Christ who redeemed you; In the Name of the Holy Spirit who sanctifies you. May your rest be this day in peace,

and your dwelling place in the Paradise of God.

A final commendatory prayer completes the service.

Please look this service up in your prayer book and read through the whole thing. Be ready to use it in case of emergency, and call your priest when a loved one seems to be near the point of death.

Every Advent, the Church teaches us that we need to be prepared for death, for none of us will live forever in this world. So we should make out our wills and choose an executor for our estate, and we should live our days in the understanding that each day is a precious gift from God. We should also be prepared to help a loved one at the time of death by leading this service if no priest is available.

I promise you that if you take me seriously as you read this article (no matter how old you are right now), and you go and find pages 462-465 in your prayer book, and read them prayerfully, you will remember that you did this when it is time to commend a loved one to God for eternity, and perhaps again in the last moments before your own death.

On Sunday, Oct. 8, one hour after the 10 am service concludes, Blessing of the Animals will take place at Grace Episcopal Church. (Why one hour later? Everyone has to go home and get their dogs, cats, birds, and other animals since only service animals are welcome at the service.)

Oct. 4 is St. Francis of Assisi Day. He is the patron saint of animals and the environment. The Italian Saint was born in 1181. He founded the Catholic order of Franciscans. He is best known for his care for animals and nature, the poor and underprivileged. He preached that all creatures are brothers and sisters under God.

My dog, Bella, has been at most Animals Blessings at Grace since we moved to Spring Hill 10 years ago. Frida, my other rescue dog, has only been once. Some years Bella has been the only dog at the service. One year 10 four legged friends joined her. Father Joe is pet friendly, so he's happy to bless as many animals as attend.

The short service will take place in Grace's front yard. There's plenty of room for all the animals. If your animal is shy or not friendly, they don't have to interact with the other attendees. In the past, some people have brought photos of their animals to be blessed.

Emotions Anonymous was started in July 1971 in St. Paul, MN by a group of people who had previously been members of another twelve-step program. EA is based on the 12 step recovery program, Alcoholics Anonymous.

Anyone experiencing emotional difficulties who is willing to try this recovery program is welcome. Most attendees gain knowledge and support from others experiencing the same or similar underlying emotions. Though the symptoms or situations may be different, the weekly support offered reminds us that we are not alone in our struggles.

EA is a spiritual program but not religious. Your personal "Higher Power" can be whatever you choose, outside of ourselves.

With the help of the Twelve Steps, you can find a new way of life. Most find recovery and you can, too.


- 1. Are the members welcoming each other warmly, but guests who are avoided may still leave feeling like an outsider?
- 2. Uninspiring worship and poor participation in the ceremony and music can be very clearly felt, instead of sensing the warm investment in the experience from all present in worship.

- 3. "Vulture Syndrome?" Some churches are looking for extra involvement of hands and hearts and that prevailing feeling is given to guests as they leave. The easy warm approach is best shown initially.
- 4. Serious visitors <u>are</u> actually looking for ways to be involved with the church they have decided on. Sunday worship and Children's Church <u>are not</u> solely enough. Community Outreach is a terrific way to engage these active people.

In my individual experiences at Grace, I am confident new members want to contribute and feel their efforts are impactful.

These guidelines can help us all relate more successfully to visitors, and I will try to be more aware of these "good church vibes" when meeting the new people entering through the Grace red door.
